Words from the Rabbi...

Look near the end of this article for the most important part of this message. The true gift of the Yamim Noraim (High Holy Days) is not so much that we will get together as a community and welcome in the New Year (though this is beautiful, sacred, and important). The real reward comes with the season's requirement that we take stock of our personal lives, and that we become the agents of our own change.



While our tradition tells us that we need to change in order to placate God, in truth, the Rabbis understood that when we improve ourselves, it is better for us as individuals and it is better for the world. Indeed, so important was this concept that the Rabbis prescribed a system called "Heshbon Hanefesh", literally an "accounting of the soul". We are required to thoroughly review our lives and see what is working and what is not. This is not an easy task and I surmise that most of us, myself included, rarely make an adequate effort to fully take advantage of what this assessment offers to us. It is just too easy to push it aside and ask for another helping of brisket.

I am hopeful that you will join me in making this the year that we truly perform this holy task.

There are many ways to do a personal review. While I will provide a few paradigms here, you should feel free to create one for yourself.

One way is to split our lives into its component parts. We can look at our personal lives, our family lives, our community lives, our business lives, our spiritual lives, our synagogue lives, or any part of our life that we feel bears review. We can check how we are doing in each sphere and make a list of changes we would like to make.

Another way is to take the time to focus on different aspects of our "selves". How is my patience, or my humility, or my diligence, or my decisiveness, or my righteousness, or my cleanliness? When we add up how each aspect is doing, we can calculate where we are.

Yet another way to do an accounting might be to treat your life as if it were a business. In this paradigm, you, as an business owner, might perform an annual review of your business

Words from the Rabbi...

A business owner performs an annual accounting to give an snapshot of where things are and where they might be headed. This also provides the answer to the question of whether the business has been profitable.

So how do we look at the balance sheet that is our lives? I have slightly revised a 5 step practical guide that was prepared by Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak Schneersohn:

First:

Draw two large squares on a paper. Title the first one: "Me and God". Title the second: "Me and other people."

Second:

In the "Me and God" category, write down the various mitzvot you have observed – e.g., Shabbat observance or repairing the world, or studying Torah, or giving tzedakah, and the degree to which you have observed them. Next to each of these mitzvot, write down whether this is an area in which you incurred a profit or loss in the past year.

Third:

In the "Me and other people" section, write down the various relationships you have. How have you gotten along with children, spouses, parents, friends, business partners, and acquaintances? Next to each of these, write whether you became closer to these people, became more distant, or whether you did things you wish you had not done. Have your relationships be profitable, or have they operated at a loss?

Fourth:

Figure out a way to take the losses for the year and turn them into profits. Ask yourself, how you can be a better parent, or grandparent, spouse, or teacher? How can you improve the atmosphere in your home? How can you devote more time to helping those in need, or repairing the world? Are there other areas that don't exist yet on your balance sheet that you should explore? A new mitzvah? A new relationship? A new outlet for who you are?

Fifth:

Look beyond all of the individual behaviors, and analyze the patterns. Try to determine

why you are succeeding in some places and failing in others. Then take steps to tailor the big picture so that the year to come is more profitable than the past year.

None of this is easy. However, only once we have truly searched to see who we are and how we are doing, can we then figure out a way to change. And only then can we consider helping others to change. This, then, becomes the most important part of this message: WE LIVE IN A WORLD THAT CLEARLY NEEDS CHANGE, AND TO BE CHANGED. ONLY AFTER WE WORK ON OURELVES CAN WE HOPE TO BE EFFECTIVE AGENTS OF THE CHANGE NEEDED.

FRED KATZ


Fred Katz is dedicated to the advancement of Judaica studies and preserving the legacies of those who perished in the Holocaust.

His time as a physician in the Vietnam War, steered him to a path of communal and professional service and paved the foundation for this book, which has taken him around the world as he photographed over 100 memorials from Auschwitz to Moscow to New York.

His photographs have been exhibited at the Breman Jewish Museum, the Atlanta Jewish Community Center, and various synagogues.

Katz is also an accomplished speaker, having lectured for the Jewish Federations of North America, radiological societies, and medical





My Road to Remembrance presents a unique opportunity for readers to remember and honor those individuals who perished during the Holocaust. This book captures a great many of the memorials designed and erected to immortalize the lives taken, and it will inspire readers to consider human rights and history.

Katz reminds us that these memorials must be seen and understood. While this collection is not meant to be a complete history or survey of all Holocaust memorials, it is an attempt to capture as many as possible. My Road to Remembrance is an important book for everyone, especially the next generation, so that we may never forget.

REFLECTIONS OF A BAAL TIKEYAH - Stu Lehrer/Religious Chairman



When I was 1 a year old, I was offered the chance to learn how to play a musical instrument - I chose the Trumpet because it is my mother's favorite instrument. Several years later, I engaged in playing the French Horn which is my favorite instrument. So, when during my college years, my childhood Shule, Beth Joseph Center of Rochester NY needed a new Baal Tikeyah, [Shofar Blower), both the Rabbi and the President of the Shule preferred one who might

have had an embouchure to conduct the Shofar service. To my great astonishment and joy, they turned to me. By the way, that President at that time was my Father z"I

So, from that moment on, when I blow Shofar, I try to instill a proper Kivanah, a serious and solemn awareness and proper and profound attitude for this tremendous Mitzvah; yet I will be honest that during those moments that I am enacting this remarkable rite, I run the gambit of inner emotions that twirl within me that actually guide and support me.

What I remember most from my first Shofar blowing on that Rosh Hashanah occurred after services were over when I joined up with my parents: upon first encountering them, I will never forget seeing their heartfelt expression of love and pride that no words could properly express. That memory is one of the illustrious thoughts that is cerebrally etched within me each time I blow Shofar.

As endearing memories play prominently in our minds and hearts, I truly remember as a child, having my father standing behind me as the Shofar was sounding. I recall how the blasts were at first alarming, almost frightening; and then with my father's comforting arms on my shoulders, I reflected on how auspicious they were, bringing the aura of the High Holidays to a special important level even more so than any other festival.

I also reflect on all the times when the Shofar was used as a symbol instrumental and monumental for gathering Am Yisrael, the People of Israel as a Kehilah, a special and unique Community, as

- when Avraham sounded the Shofar as gratitude to Hashem
- when the Shofar sounded at Mt Sinai as Hashem presented the Ten Commandments to Mosheh to the Bnai Yisrael
- when the Shofar sounded so that the walls could tumble down so Joshua could take Jericho for the new freed and settled Hebrew nation
- as the 'country crier' to proclaim the Jubilee Year for the gift of freedom commences
- and so on for all the times the mighty Shofar was presaged to the sanctity, protection, and preservation of Kial Yisrael

I believe that this brings a continuance of Dor L'Dor, generation to generation for a grace and stronghold for the future.

At the August 13, 2023 Congregation meeting, four members were elected to two year terms on the Board of Trustees. They were Terry Robinovitz and Mitch Frumkin elected to another term, and Ken Podos and Bonni Rubin-Sugarman elected as new members. Members Don Pripstein and Rob Van Naarden could not run this year because of the 3 term limit set in our Constitution.

Thirty one voting members were in attendance in person or by zoom, which barely gave a quorum of paid up voting members or households. Fourteen Board members were present, 10 in person and 4 by zoom.






