Words from the Rabbi...

As I am writing this article, Israel has been forced, yet again, to strike back at evil. With 1400 innocent people, tortured, mutilated, raped, burned, and murdered, and thousands more injured, Israel has been forced to put an end to those seeking to do it harm. Much of the world was initially shocked but, amazingly, there were still large numbers who either said it did not happen, excused it, or blamed it on Israel. (Disconcertingly,



many of the deniers are in this country). Worse, others said that it was "resistance", or "de-colonizing, or "freedom-fighters". I fear that if the victims were not Jewish, none of these excuses would be uttered.

Now that Israel is on the offensive against Hamas, predictably, much the world is actively turning against Israel. It seems that every country is permitted to do what it needs to do to ensure its safety, except Israel. When you are the only Jewish State, and the only democracy in a region of autocratic (despotic) theocracies, you are always targeted, and you are held to a moral standard that would be impossible for the likes of Gandhi, Jesus, or Mother Teresa. (At the same time, I believe that, while Israel is justified to do everything it needs to do to eradicate Hamas and to ensure there can never be a repeat of the October 7th pogrom, we must have rachmanus, and pray for, the soul of every innocent killed in this war.)

Despite the horribly gruesome acts perpetrated against Israelis, in Israel, by Hamas the governing body of the Palestinians in Gaza, the media and world leaders continue to play the moral equivalency game. To them, there is no difference between terrorists murdering, raping, mutilating, and torturing, innocent civilians and the Israeli people defending themselves against this barbaric activity. One of the most frustrating things is to hear a constant chorus of "Israel stop your bombing", while there is barely a stage whisper of "Let the hostages go".

As a people, we have seen this before. From the very moment we were first dispersed until the present day, we have known what it is to be attacked and then blamed for being attacked. Incredulously we have often been told that the attacks against our people have been justified. Justification came in the name of lies. Move to any time of persecution and you will find that those who sought to destroy us said we deserved what we got because we killed Jesus, or because we killed Christian children, or

because we purposefully spread disease, or because we had a plot to take over the world, or because we were not human. Today it is justified because we are "colonizers".

These folks do not understand that it is impossible for us to be "colonizers" since there has been a Jewish presence in our homeland for 3,500 years. The truth is unwelcomed when it stands in the way of their argument.

Meanwhile, here in the States, we find ourselves fighting a two-front war. Not only do we need to support Israel with all our resources, but we are in the midst of an antisemitic eruption that we have not seen since American Nazis paraded in Madison Square Garden in 1939. Unfortunately, and I say this with hesitancy and sadness, there is no difference between the people with Palestinian flag wrapped around them, and the brown shirts of the Nazis.

It all feels very much as if we are in an existential moment. But I have faith in the Jewish people. I have faith in our country. I have faith in Israel. And I have faith in God. (I do not have so much faith in the other nations of this world).

What are we to do? Unfortunately, we have been here before. As Kohelet wrote: "There is nothing new under the sun".

First, we must refuse, in the most active means possible, to accept the status quo. We must post the truth on social media. We must continually contact our local, state, and federal representatives and let them know that we unwaveringly support Israel in what it has been forced to do, and that they must help us to eradicate antisemitism. Whenever we watch, hear, or read a biased news report, we must reach out to CAMERA or Honest Reporting.

Perhaps most importantly we need to let each other, and our Israeli brothers and sisters, know how much we care. We need to stand firmly with each other. We need to be ambassadors for our people. If you see something wrong said about Jews or Israel, speak up. Become active in Israel advocacy. If you witness antisemitism, in whatever form, don't ignore it.

From our President ...

I write to you as we have all been enduring the past several excruciating weeks watching the barbaric, immoral, uncivilized massacres wrought by Hamas, the Iran-backed terror group controlling Gaza (from which Israel fully withdrew in 2005). Hamas launched an unprovoked and vicious surprise attack on Israeli civilians. Using paragliders, boats, motorcycles and other vehicles, terrorists infiltrated Israel on October 7 with one goal—to murder and kidnap Israeli civilians. More precisely—to kill Jews. More than 260 Israelis were slaughtered while watching attending an open air music festival. Women and children were ripped from their homes, women and young girls were raped and kidnapped. Entire families, including very young children, were murdered in their homes. Babies were beheaded. Thousands of missiles have been fired indiscriminately into Israel reaching far into the country. More than 1,400 Israelis have been killed thus far in what has been described as Israel's 9/11. These acts of barbarism are not about addressing the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. Hamas has demonstrated its utter disregard for the Palestinian people itself in the way it has turned Gaza into a terrorist haven, diverting funds to itself rather than to the 2 million Palestinians who live there and who have self-rule. Rather, what we are watching is nothing short of a purposeful slaughter of Jews for being Jewish, and Hamas acting to "wipe Israel from the map" as Iran has promised to do.

And at the same time we also have to absorb the almost inconceivable protests on college campuses and in many of our cities comprised of people (students, professors alike) who are actually celebrating the Hamas slaughter, holding signs saying things like "Palestine will be free by any means" and chanting "from the river to the sea, Palestine will be free", an only thinly veiled threat to exterminate the more than 7 million Jews in Israel.

For me, as the child of a Holocaust survivor, while I rarely make such comparisons, what Hamas has done directly equates to Nazi/Gestapo acts of inhumanity. Hamas' actions mirror the horrific pogroms in which entire villages of Jews were murdered in Russia and neighboring countries simply for being Jewish; the acts resulting in the carnage and death of Armenians by the Ottomans in World War 1; and the inhuman slaughter of the Tutsi minority by the Hutus in Rwanda. While the scope of these past atrocities may be more vast in scale, the evil is directly comparable. And the fact that we live amongst people who support such atrocities reminds us all that "Never Again" must not be an empty slogan but must grow sharp and ferocious teeth, and fast.

We must not be complacent. We must not sit idly by. We must act. What has occurred thus far simply exceeds all boundaries of what Israel experiences as "routine terrorism". And as Americans, we too are in the crosshairs of these evil religious fanatics. They would not stop their conquest at Israel—remember, America is the "Great Satan". Thus Israel fights for herself, for our people, and for the future of the civilized Western world.

I suggest the following actions, from the non-partisan American Jewish Committee:

- 1. CALL ON ALL ELECTED OFFICIALS IN AMERICA TO ACT: At this moment, Israel needs the unwavering support of the American people. Reach out to federal, state, and local leaders to unequivocally condemn Hamas and stand with Israel against terror. And don't be afraid to directly condemn and call out those politicians who fragrantly support Hamas.
- 2. STAY UP TO DATE ON THE EVOLVING SITUATION: WE should access only credible news sources and pay attention to the broader implications for Israel, the region, and the international community. READ AND SHARE THE FACTS!
- 3. PUBLICLY SHOW YOUR SUPPORT: I encourage all those who support Israel to showcase it loudly and proudly. Make your support for Israel and your despair about Hamas's despicable acts known--through social media, op-eds, and conversations with family and friends. Be vocal. Don't underestimate the important role you can play by sharing your thoughts and FACTS with your networks. It is shocking just how many people do not have a basic understanding of the history of Israel and her rebirth on 1948.
- 4. FOR ANYONE WHO WISHES TO DONATE TO AN ORGANIZATION WHICH WILL PROVIDE DIRECT AIDE: I suggest either FIDF (Friends of Israel Defense Forces) or Magen David Odam (Israel's emergency/disaster medical and paramedic response team). You can

donate to these charities by googling their links. There are many other reliable places to donate as well. Every donation of whatever size matters!

- **5. AND FOR THOSE WHO PRAY**, I share this from a stalwart and reliable Christian Zionist, Pastor Robert Stearns:
- Pray for God's continued wisdom for Israel's leaders.
- Pray for God's comfort for those who have lost or missing loved ones.
- Pray for God's protection for those who are battling to defend Israel.
- Pray for protection for the citizens of Israel from further violence and destruction.

May God Bless the United States and America, and may God bless and protect the State of Israel and all her people, Jews, Muslims and Christians alike.



PRESIDENT'S YOM KIPPUR MESSAGE 5784

Shana Tovah Umetukah and G'mar Chatimah Tovah

This is Phil Rosenzweig, the president of the JCC of LBI and I am honored to be addressing you for this Yom Kippur appeal. I wish that I could be with you all in person, but as many of you know, I have a child still in high school and that tethers us to Main Line of Philadelphia and our home synagogue Har Zion Temple. But believe me, my heart is with you and I wish I could be with you in person.

I want to talk to you this Yom Kippur about something that is rooted in a quote that I'd like to share with you from the inimitable Irving Berlin who said, "the toughest thing about success is that you've got to keep on being a success", and I think that that is the theme that I want to infuse my comments with today, because I want to celebrate and congratulate the JCC for a remarkable 5783, a year of many, many, many successes. We all have a lot to be proud of. We had a terrific year both from a religious observance perspective where we celebrated the holidays with great passion and commitment, with great crowds and with the terrific leadership of Rabbi Jay and Cantor Geller who really brought us to spiritual heights and led us from the High Holiday services to many Shabbats and all of the holidays in between. We had Shabbat services on the beach, frequently, there were 8 of them this past season and we had attendance of more than 100 people at some of those Shabbat services; we should all feel really satisfied that we are returning to a place of worship and spiritual sharing that binds us together as a community.

But speaking of us as a community, there have also been remarkable community events throughout the entire year. We've had speakers of interest, intellect and passion addressing many of the things we all care about, we've had a vibrant and remarkably successful WAX series of programs from brunches, gatherings, games and speakers. We had a year filled with success from a religious observance standpoint, from a community standpoint and from a friendship standpoint, and I am so proud of us, as I know the feeling of warmth and commitment and community that everybody in this congregation conveys is felt by so so many, including the several dozen new members who have joined, each and every one of whom cited the warmth of the community and the leadership of Rabbi Jay as reasons for them joining, as they spend more and more time on our beloved island.

And we've done all that, and done it with such precision and success, in the context of a very tough world in which we are living, where antisemitism is actually felt within the community in which we live, in the state in which we live, in the country in which we live, in the world in which we live. And of course, the Long Beach Township Police Department has been remarkable in sheltering us and protecting us so that we will be safe, and we've had remarkable board leadership which has engaged in programs designed to keep us safe on a going forward basis. All of that is success, and all of that is the kind of success that we at the JCC strive to achieve. 5783 has brought us that level of success. So what does that mean for us as a community? It means that we want more of it. We want more religious observance with passion, verve, commitment and the feeling of community. We want more social programs in which we can all be together, and we want more of the kind of things that we've introduced to the JCC over the course of the past year or so, like pickleball, which gets us together, which gets us to be active, which gets us to interact with each other to have a social experience (and also helps us get some exercise in the process!) All of those things are indicia of success.

What does it take for us to continue to achieve that remarkable level of practice, events and happenings at the JCC? It takes a number of things, including the provision of security to make everybody, as we gather in groups, feel comfortable that we have taken every measure possible to protect ourselves. It also takes resources. In the hyper-inflationary environment in which we live these days, everything that we do costs us more money, and although I would really rather speak to you just about the happy things that are going on at the JCC and the sense of community that we are all building upon event after event, service after service, and gathering after gathering, for whatever purpose, alas those things cost the community

money and we are, for some, a second congregation and for others a primary congregation. We have not raised dues at the JCC since 2017. We have a very modest dollar amount of dues, and we have a very small security fee and the past year's success has proven that our revenue from those things simply doesn't cover our expense to do them.

Our answer is not, under any circumstance, to change the trajectory of our programming. In fact, we want to double down. We want to do everything that we've done in this past year and we want to do more, and we want to do it together, and we want to do it in a way that continues to build the JCC as the home, the spiritual home, the social home, the emotional home and the sense of place for our people, not only on Long Beach Island, not only in Manahawkin and Stafford and Barnegat and the places immediately outside of the island, not only Southern Ocean County, but frankly in the State of New Jersey as a whole. Our level of success, our level of programming, our level of activity far exceeds that of congregations 2 and 3 times the size of ours, and yet we do it and we have done it and we can all be satisfied that 5783 brought that success to us.

So how do we honor the commitment that we have made together as a community, I to you, you to the shul, and each of us to each other, in order to ensure that success and to meet Irving Berlin's challenge that success brings the expectation of more success? We do that by digging deep and helping the JCC have the financial resources in order to pay for the costs and expenses, including security, that go along with enjoying that level of programming. We only have a few sources of revenue that are at the shul outside of additional charitable giving. We have our membership dues, we have our small security fee, we have the sale of High Holiday seats and the major component that I'm about to talk to you about which is today's Yom Kippur appeal, and the appeal is a critical part of our budget. I'm very proud to say that in 5783 we set a record for our congregation for that appeal.

I'm asking you to join me, my wife Beth, our kids Thea and Ian, the JCC family, other JCC board members and other members of the JCC community in doing the very best you can this year by giving to the shul for the Yom Kippur appeal so that we can not only exceed last year's record level of giving, but that we can ensure that we have the resources necessary to not only provide the same level of programming that we did in 5783, but to make 5784 the most vibrant year that our Jewish Community Center of Long Beach Island has every had! So please, I understand that we are living in times where everybody's personal expenses have gone up, where there is uncertainty, there is concern, there are many challenges and many places that need our commitment of resources, but we are a small congregation doing the work of a mighty congregation – we are a mighty congregation – despite our size, and I want you to please join me in giving the very best gift you can to the JCC of LBI, this Yom Kippur, this High Holiday appeal time, so that we can have a remarkable and even better 5784 where we tell the island, our community over the bridge, which is so vital to our shul itself, Southern Ocean County, Ocean County, the State of New Jersey and all who are paying attention, that even in the face of great challenges, and particularly in the face of those who do not wish us well, that we thrive, we are vibrant, we succeed, we are succeeding more than before, and we are succeeding in spite of those who don't wish us to succeed.



A Quiet American Jew

I have always been a quiet American Jew. I am not religious. I am not kosher. My children do not go to a Jewish day school, and I do not go to synagogue on most Shabbats. Instead, I quietly celebrate the high holidays, quietly respond "thank you" when a stranger wishes me a Merry Christmas at Hannukah time, quietly pray to Gd when I am really desperate and quietly thank Gd for all of the blessings in my life. Quietly try to instill a love of Judaism in my children, while quietly hoping that they will gain this love without putting in much effort. And certainly, I never publicly declare or display my love of Judaism or Israel, because, after all, I am just a quiet American Jew.

So why is a quiet American Jew so deeply affected by the atrocities in Israel? Why is the pain of a quiet American Jew so deep? Am I even entitled to feel so heartbroken or to express my anger and frustration when I am just a quiet American Jew? I don't know that I can articulate the answers to these questions, as the answers are deeply rooted in the fabric of every Jew. Of course, as a human being, the horrors committed upon the Jewish people should elicit heartbreak and outrage in any decent person. Surely, if a quiet American Jew can recognize this, everyone should, right?

But, more than outrage and heartbreak from one human being to another, there is something else happening to this quiet American Jew, something so much more. Something has awakened inside of me. A profound love and connection to my people, to my brothers and sisters in Israel, and to the generations who came before me. The knowledge that antisemitism lives in the loud actions of our enemies, but also in the quiet silence of some neighbors and friends. A deep connection to a strong community coming together in unity, both Jews and non-Jews alike, as my feelings of loneliness turn to solidarity. A bravery and resilience of my people that I had only read about and heard stories of, but now have the honor of witnessing firsthand. And most importantly, I have awakened to the realization that I no longer have the luxury of being a quiet American Jew. None of us do.






