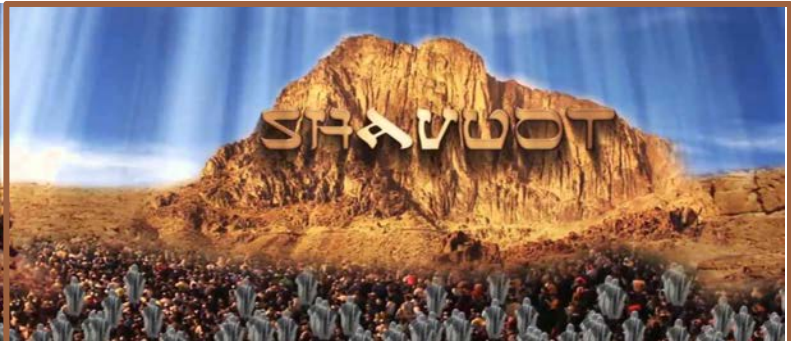

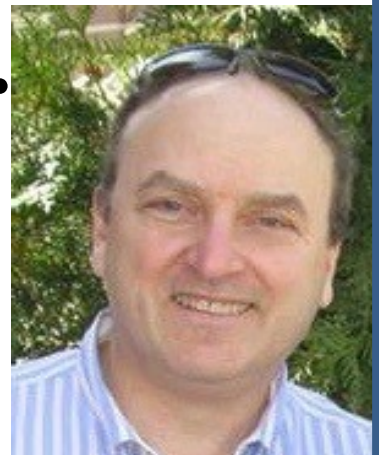

Words from the Rabbi...

With Passover tucked safely behind us, Shavuot looms large ahead, like Mount Sinai from which the Ten Commandments were given. Indeed, Shavuot commemorates our receipt of the Torah from God. But, between the two Festivals is a countdown numbering 49 days. Our biblical ancestors took a day's measure (omer) of the first barley harvest to the



Temple. After the completion of this ritual, by which the Israelites showed their gratitude for the grain, the people were allowed to enjoy eating the produce of the new harvest. When the Temple was destroyed and the Jewish people became less agricultural, this ritual might have quietly faded. However, through the brilliance of the Rabbis, the Counting of the Omer was maintained as a spiritual practice, although its interpretation changed.

The 49 days from Passover to Shavuot became known as the transition from being enslaved in Egypt to freely encountering God at Mt Sinai. For each of these 49 days we acknowledge one more step in our journey toward spiritual and emotional freedom.

But counting the Omer serves another purpose. This ancient practice importantly helps us to keep track of time. Additionally, through it, we can mark changes in ourselves and in the world around us. Each evening after sundown (which is the beginning of the next day according to Jewish tradition) we put aside what we are doing and say the ritual words "Today is the twelfth [or whatever] day of the counting of the Omer."

This brief daily moment in time gives us the opportunity for reflection. And it is in this moment of reflection that we can begin the process of working on improving ourselves and the world around us. Each day that we count we should take an aspect of our lives that we would like to change and focus on it. For instance, last night was the fifteenth night in the counting of the Omer and I decided that I would be more attentive to the calendar and things that I need to do. Tonight I will focus on the impact of harmful words. Perhaps tomorrow night I will focus on being more attentive to my needs and the needs of my family. Perhaps on other days I will focus on God's attributes of being compassionate, gracious, slow to anger, loving, kind, true, and forgiving. My hope is to make

myself a better person, a better husband, a better father, a better friend, and a better Rabbi.

The ultimate goal would be that if each of us uses this daily method of reflection, it will lead to a change in our personal behavior. If each of us improves his/her behavior, the impact it would have on our homes and our communities would be immeasurable. And if more people and communities did the same, think of the improvement that the world would see.

Why do I mention the above exercise? We are in a time of extreme stress and constant negative reinforcement. Self-help and self-growth is at a premium in the current environment. In order to face and confront the negative stimuli in the world, we each need to work on strengthening ourselves to bolster our communal, and our Jewish, defenses.

Last Rosh Hashanah I discussed the increase of antisemitism, the increase of anti-Israel rhetoric, and how the two are connected. You can see this playing out on college campuses today and around the world. We need to make a concerted effort to fight and push against all of this. One important way to do this is to start to actively strengthen ourselves and our connection to our tradition. The above exercise provides one way to begin this process.

Another way to begin the fight back is through education.

This summer, on Monday mornings, I will be teaching an in-depth course on the Arab-Israeli Conflict. It will look at the conflict from its very beginnings in the late 19th century to the present. The best way to fight against evil, and intentional, misinformation is through education. Join me for a class that will go from 10:00 until 11:30, in person and on-line.

On Wednesday evenings, beginning June 19th we will be discussing God and asking questions like: "Who-or what-is God?", "Is God like a person?", "Does God have a gender?", "Does God have a special relationship with the Jewish People?", "Does God intervene in our lives?", "Is God Good?", and much, much more. We will be using the book: "*Thinking About God*", by Rabbi Kari H. Tuling.

We will continue to study Torah on Thursday mornings at 11:00, and the Prophets on Fridays, after morning services. Join us!!

Join us for Friday night dinner on July 5th, when Dr. Eric Mandel will provide his annual "Update on Israel and the Middle East".

A final note: Look for information about a program on Thursday evening, May 23rd, at 8:30 in which I will be having a conversation with Professor Alan Dershowitz.

A well informed and knowledgeable Jewish community is the best way to address the complex issues confronting us and all Jews everywhere.

Our Island is near idyllic. From Holgate to Barnegat Light, from the Bay to the Ocean, and from sunrise to sunset, our little piece of the world is about as good as it gets. By working on ourselves, and learning, we can ensure that we are matched our surroundings and empowered to bring a little of it wherever we go.

From our President . . .

We have just finished celebrating Passover, the remembrance and celebration of our departure from Egypt and of our freedom from slavery, during a time when more than 130 hostages held by the murderous terror group Hamas, to the extent any of them are still alive, are decidedly not free.

And, during this Pesach, we also endured the highly organized anti-Semitic rage mobs spewing vile unfiltered anti-Semitic chants which far exceed any “legitimate” protest parameters or free speech mandates. Some leaders of these part student led and part outside agitator led violent mobs have out right called for the murder of Jews. Jewish students are unsafe, intimidated, harassed and made to feel unwelcome on American soil. Shades of Germany, on its college campuses, in the 1930s, pre Nazi rule. The similarities are unmistakable.

In some instances, strong college/university leaders have intervened aggressively, and the demonstrations have come to a rapid conclusion. Yet, in other instances, university administrations have utterly failed to intervene, and have failed to protect Jewish students. Can you imagine if the chants from a mob were threatening to a black or brown student constituency, or to an LGBTQ constituency? Do you believe that those same university leaders would remain quiet, or fail to intervene? How about the deafening silence from some of our countries’ political leaders? Is that silence even remotely OK?

Vehi Sheamda (Hebrew: וְהִיא שְׁעֵמֶדָה) is a *piyyut* (liturgical poem) in the Haggadah that mentions God's promise of ending the exile of the Jews from the Land of Israel.

In that piyut, as a community we observe that: In each and every generation they rise up against us to destroy us. And the Holy One, blessed be He, rescues us from their hands.

From our President . . .

Not since the Holocaust has our people faced such severe, pervasive and vicious anti- Semitism, and as Americans, we observe and feel the rise of not only anti Israel sentiment but also outright Jew hatred on too many college campuses nationwide and in American cities such as Dearborn Michigan and Manhattan/New York.

And many of us have faced more local expressions of the rise of anti Israel and anti Jewish hate, both large and small. On my home turf, The Bryn Mawr Film Institute canceled the showing of an Israeli made film having nothing to do with politics or Israel based on the purported concern that radical Students for Justice in Palestine—Haverford College students threatened to protest. The gutless decision to cancel the screening brought an outcry from our community and ultimately 300 Jews from across the American political spectrum showed up to protest the film's cancellation and two Zionist activist lawyers filed a lawsuit to compel the showing of the film. And the film was ultimately screened—with hundreds attending and two people protesting in person. Our community stood up against hate, ignorance and bullying. We stood tall and proud. We did not cower.

As American Jews we face the unpleasant reality that even in this great country, we must confront hate. Now, it is organized hate designed to align various forces of Jew hatred. We all must stand tall, proud and resolute. We must resolve to be more vigilant, more outspoken and more present. We must defend our rights and we must insist that those whom we elect to government also protect our rights. We must not allow us as Jews to become “the other” in the greatest nation of freedom and liberty ever known. We must be the soldiers in our own army, protecting and preserving who we are as a people, as well as our eternal right to our God given homeland of thousands of years. And we must have faith that once again, as has been the case for the same thousands of years, that the Holy One will rescue us from the hands of those who seek to destroy us. .

I look forward to a summer of peace, tranquility and better times on LBI this summer season!

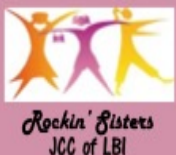

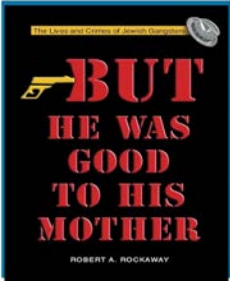

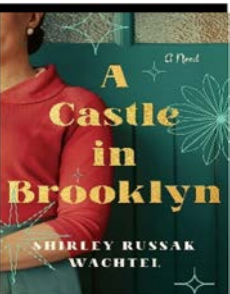
But He Was Good to His Mother: The Lives and Crimes of Jewish Gangsters
